A thought from the Vicarage

One of my favourite poets is Robert Frost. He wrote some incredible poetry.

In one of my favourites he writes about standing at a divergence of two paths and choosing to take, 'the one less travelled by'.

He muses how he was sorry he could not take both paths. Experience had taught him that by choosing one he was, in truth, never going to know where the other would have taken him.

As I write this letter the discussions are raging over whether Scotland should break from the United Kingdom. By the time you read this you'll know.

In the churches there have been a lot of discussions about how we should organise the ministry in the churches and chapels in the County.

There are two paths ahead it seems.

In one we struggle on with fewer and fewer clergy as 40% of the clergy retire and cannot be replaced or, frankly, afforded. The result might be that like a business the churches and chapels would concentrate on the big churches and chapels in the towns and people would have to travel. In the other we share out the tasks once done by the

clergy and do more and more of the informal caring for each other that we have always done. This way we keep the church and chapels local.

It will mean that church services will be taken by a wider variety of people but this way there will still be a person in each village that people can go to. The network of Christian caring in our communities would continue.

In our area because it is so sparsely populated the churches have been run by teams for a very long time. Churchwardens, retired clergy, Readers, Local Preachers, Chapel Stewards, the folk who clean the churches and chapels ...the list goes on. Together as a team we have looked after our local buildings and tried to be there when folk needed us.

Sometimes there are two stark choices. At other times in God's providence things evolve. I think God has been preparing us for a long time to take more responsibility locally for our churches and chapels. I know there are some fantastic people already doing a great deal. However it cannot be left to just a few. We need more people to share this very important work.

If you feel that you could give a few hours to the community, please ring me on 015396 24045. It could be practical – to do with buildings or grounds – or it could be more to do with the spiritual life of the area; but we need everyone to join in to make this path the one that carries on the rich Christian heritage in this area. Do not think, 'somebody else will do it' – it is for all of us to get involved if this is going to work.

Fine day till 20th or so the dull, dry then by 24th sun and rail. Colder nights but no frost.

Orton The East Westmorland R.D.C. at Kirkby Stephen will adopt the Raisbeck – Sunbiggin Road once it has been repaired by the users (farmers). It could be extended to Great Asby too.

Harvest Services Orton Wesleyan Church, Sunday 27th Sept., Church, Friday evening 2nd and Sunday 4th, Primitive Methodist church “very hearty singing” on Sunday, 4th.

Mr. Henry Hewitson Bland, an elderly farmer, at Measand, fell through his attic window early on 20th when he thought he saw burglars (his fixation). He was dead when found and was buried at Orton on 24th next to his father, Mr. Stephen Brunskill Bland who died in 1863.

Tebay's Mr. Albert Young has joined the NER Battalion now at Hull. His colleagues gave him a big send-off with salvo of detonators as the train steamed out of the station. (Report 3rd October). Nine Army Officers are touring the Upper Eden this month, recruiting. They were in Tebay in 2nd week of October. Tebay Mart (Cross Keys) Special Sale on 15th October (livestock).

Ravenstonedale Church's Harvest was on Friday evening, 25th And Sunday 27th September – much helped by produce from the Metcalfe-Gibsons.

I

Incarnation

Though this term is not found in the Bible, the doctrine it refers to is Biblical: "The Word became flesh " (*John 1:14*). The amazing truth is that God, though eternal and infinite, became a normal human being. He knows what it is to be hungry and thirsty, to laugh and cry, to be tempted, to be lonely, to have to earn your living, to live in a family and in a community; to be mocked, to have false accusations made against you, to suffer, to die. He knows what we go through, because he has been here! (*Not to be confused with "Reincarnation", a belief found in oriental faiths that we live many lives.*)

Israel

The name first given to Jacob (*Genesis 32:28*), probably meaning "he struggles with God", but from then on used as the name of all the descendants of Jacob, "the children of Israel". Israel's birth as a nation stems from the Exodus from Egypt, after which it was also used for the country they lived in. Though the nation was split, sent into exile, and ruled over the centuries by various foreign powers, in the New Testament Jesus says he was sent "to the lost sheep of Israel". In other words his first calling was to be the Messiah for the Jews, and only then for the non-Jews or Gentiles, whom he refers to as his "other sheep". The Christian church is referred to by Paul as the new Israel, or the "Israel of God" (*Galatians 6:16*) – the people of God now are not just the Jewish race, but all of any nation who turn to Christ.

A VIEW FROM TEBAY

This morning I was listening to the "Today" programme on Radio 4, prior to getting up, and between 7.30 and 7.55 I heard five items which gave me food for thought. In no particular order of importance these were: a fire at a Manchester Dogs' Home, the Ebola outbreak in Liberia, dementia in Wales, the continuing problems in the Middle East; and the Scottish Referendum. Had it not been for a well-thought-out "Thought for the Day" the sequence of reports would have been very depressing. Such news items are fairly common and as I get older they depress me all the more.

An article in the Autumn edition of "The Reader" (*a magazine for Licensed Readers in the Church of England*) gave me further food for thought. It was by a 75-year-old Reader who wrote about the changing nature of his ministry as he got older. His ideas struck a chord in me, because I now find my ministry altering with my age. I no longer have the energy I used to have and I now find simple tasks increasingly difficult. I realise that my contribution to God's work in our parishes will get less and less. I am very pleased, therefore, that other lay people are taking up their share of the work in order to help Beverley and Sandra in their multifarious tasks.

This was shown the other week by the number of people who helped in the service at Shap Wells, which I found very moving even though I was unable to take a full part. Between now and Christmas I hope to be involved regularly in the pattern of services, especially in Tebay. Remembrance Sunday will be special this year as we think of the start of World War 1, in which my father fought and about which he rarely spoke. I wish now that I had asked him more about his experiences, which must have had a lasting effect on him.

Meanwhile life in and around

Tebay goes on pretty normally with the soccer season under way and all the usual meetings. Monday mornings in "The Hub" are well attended, as are the craft sessions at the Chapel. As with most of the local villages and towns there are a lot of houses for sale – six within 50 yards of mine, for example – and I understand twelve new houses are planned for the field next to the Cross Keys. I wonder who is likely to want them at present, with the bus services in doubt and full-time work not all that plentiful. I console myself with the thought that by the time such dwellings are built I may no longer be concerned with such matters.

Quite by chance, in the post this morning was a letter and brochure from York Courses. It is now a few years since we used one of their Lent Courses in Tebay but my name is obviously still on their list. I always enjoyed leading discussions based on their material but I now lack the confidence to offer to lead such a course again. Perhaps someone else will show interest so I will keep the material in case that happens.

Looking in the Lectionary at some of the Bible readings for the coming Sunday I have been struck by two phrases from two different Old Testament books – Jeremiah and Psalms – in which the writer asserts that "people are fools" and "The fool says in his heart, there is no God." I have just heard of the death of a man who would probably have used similar words to describe those who disagreed with his beliefs, Ian Paisley, who railed against Roman Catholics and Republicans in Ireland for many years, only to make a friend of one of his chief adversaries in his last few years. Hatred of someone who does not share one's religious beliefs is much in evidence all over the world at present, and reconciliation between sworn enemies appears a forlorn hope.

Whatever your thoughts about faith and churchgoing, I hope and pray that the work of the churches and chapels in our area will go on

making life more bearable for everybody in our communities. Events like the recent funeral service for Marian Winder at which the chapel was full to overflowing and where Phil Dew gave a moving address, surely touch the hearts and lives of everybody. She was a true Christian lady and a fine example to anyone who had the privilege to know her.

By the time I again contribute to The Link, autumn will have ended. After a good summer and, so far, a pleasant autumn perhaps we can look forward to a reasonable winter. I hope for all our sakes this turns out to be the case and that Christmas sees us all cheerful and thankful for God's goodness.

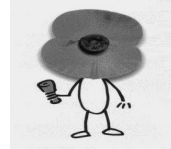

Report from Rev. Nelson Isebagheen, now studying for a degree at Bishop Barham College, Kabale, near Kampala.

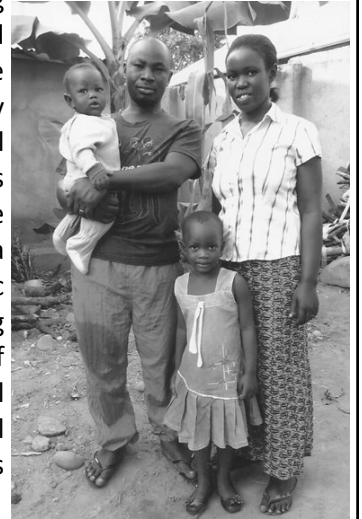

Orton and Tebay Local History Society

Orton & Tebay Local History Society welcomed one of its own members, Professor Ian Carradice, to tell us about "Recent Treasures of Cumbria".

Ian chose The Coinage of the Roman Empire to study at St. Andrews University and has since been on the Treasure Valuation Committee, which has the job of valuing all the treasure found in England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

First of all we were asked "What is Treasure"? This can be anything that is meaningful to you but for this evening we were to learn about what is officially called treasure. It started in the middle ages when it was a means for the crown to obtain money. If anything of value was lost, when it was found it belonged to the crown. It was a way of the King making money.

In 1996 Treasure was redefined and it is all about metal, mainly gold or silver. Anything pre Roman made of any metal is considered treasure. Post Roman it has to contain some gold or silver. It also has to be that the owner or their descendants cannot be found. The Treasure Valuation Committee only deals with items that are wanted by a museum. If a museum wishes to buy found items the finder of the treasure is given a reward to the value decided by the committee. When a person finds an item it must be declared to the local coroner. Many people think that they own what they find but this is not so, and they are not entitled to keep anything found until the decision has been made by the coroner. If a museum is not interested the item is given back to the finder; if a museum is interested, the finder gets the market value of the find and they are not allowed to keep the item. It does not belong to them.

We looked at photographs of treasure found in Cumbria over the last few years. Only about 1% of treasure valued under the Valuations Committees' jurisdiction is found in Cumbria every year. This is probably because we have more sheep than people and it has always been so.

We were passed an old Roman silver coin from the 1st

century to look at and asked to consider its value then and now. (At the end of the meeting we discovered this was the same – the price of a sheep).

We looked at the Crosby Garret Helmut find. It was not treasure as it did not fall within the category because it had been restored before it was declared. If it had been taken to a museum in pieces, as it was found, it would have been treasure but as it had been put back together it was a single item and therefore not treasure. It was undeniably an important item which is now in private hands. To cover this event happening again the law will have to be changed.

An interesting evening learning about treasure trove.

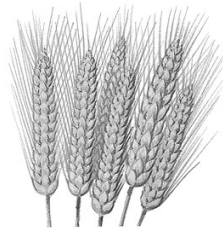

Changes to Church Life are coming

Shap Wells Deanery Meeting

On the 27th August there was a meeting in Shap Wells Hotel, to which members of all our churches (Church of England and Methodist) were invited. The purpose of the meeting was to hear and discuss the latest report of a local churches Planning Group. They had been given a task by the Methodist, United Reformed and Anglican Churches in Cumbria – to “explore the local implications of the Diocesan Ministry Strategy”.

Background

By 2023 there will be at least 20% fewer full-time clergy, because of death and retirement. The Diocese has come up with a strategy to meet this crisis, by forming what it calls “Mission Communities”. These are to be:

- Groupings of churches
- Ecumenical – i.e. not just Church of England but working with Christians of different traditions
- Led by clergy, both paid (stipendiary) and unpaid (self-supporting)
- Using the many gifts of lay people – Christians who are not ordained
- Exploring “pioneer ministry” – forms of outreach to those parts of the community that the church hardly reaches by traditional patterns of church life.

Money

At present money given by church members in Appleby Deanery totals £302,000 *per annum* to pay for clergy stipends, houses and pensions. If all current vacancies in the Deanery were filled with paid clergy, the cost of maintaining all the clergy would be £442,000.

Living within our means, together with the likely reduction of available clergy, is going to demand a significant change – whatever strategy we adopt.

Research

The Shaping Group did extensive research into church and community life in our area, looking at:

- Existing links between parishes, such as where people go to do their shopping or to visit the doctor, as well as relationships with other churches
- How strong congregations are, their age range, how good they are at present at reaching into their local community, what gifts and abilities can be discerned
- How many baptisms, weddings and funerals take place; whether there are small groups like Bible Studies, prayer groups and choirs
- Their buildings – both the facilities and their state of repair
- Their finances

Principles

The church is the people, not the building. Therefore

- “Ministry” is the work of all baptised and committed Christians, not just of clergy
- All members must be helped to grow in faith, develop their gifts, and rediscover the mission given by Christ to take the gospel to all people
- Christians belong to one another. Therefore
 - ◊ We must work together – we are the Body of Christ, and all limbs need each other
 - ◊ The stronger or richer must help the weaker or poorer
- The Christian faith should be expressed in every local community. Therefore
 - ◊ There should be a living church fellowship in every community

- ◊ We should not plan to close churches

An umbrella

The Shaping Group proposes that we create Mission Communities using the model of an umbrella – a strong hub supporting the weaker edges by strong spokes. If a Mission Community is like this, a strong, central congregation – the “hub” – can support weaker congregations by sharing resources.

- There are two major “hub” churches in our Deanery, in Appleby and Kirkby Stephen
- Smaller “hubs” are at Morland, Orton and Shap
 - There are some other strong local congregations, and other weaker ones needing support

The aims of the strategy

- To **grow disciples** – to lead people to a personal faith, and help them to grow in that faith
- To **minister to every person** – offering pastoral care, diversity of worship, opportunities to minister to local people through baptisms, weddings and funerals, and other innovative ways of outreach
- **Mutual support** – for clergy and lay people to share their gifts with each other, their church, and other churches
- **Realistic finance** – a commitment to generous and sacrificial giving
- **Imaginative use of buildings**
- **30% of resources** - including time and energy – to be deployed in **pioneering ministry**, such as the Network Youth Church
- **Working towards ecumenical sharing** – initially with informal arrangements, varying from place to place

How might it look? Two Mission Communities:

At the moment, this is only a proposal, but the Shaping Group believes that the best option for us would be to divide the local area into two Mission Communities:

- The northern part of the Deanery, served from Appleby, would include parishes around Morland, Askham, Warcop and Musgrave
- The southern part, served from Kirkby Stephen, would include Orton and the other High Westmorland parishes, and the parishes around Kirkby Stephen and Brough.

Each Mission Community might eventually have:

- ◊ Three paid clergy – two Anglican and one Methodist
- ◊ Good, paid administrative support, so that clergy are set free to do what they were ordained for
- ◊ A growing number of self-supporting clergy – retired or non-stipendiary ministers – to support sacramental life
- ◊ Local churches to be overseen by growing lay ministry teams
- ◊ A substantial commitment to pioneer forms of ministry, including youth

When will it happen?

When it can! The full implementation of this pattern is likely to take at least ten years, but we can start now, informally, in any ways we can. Some places will move faster than others.

These proposals, being discussed with meetings around the Deanery, will be passed up to the Archdeaconry and the Diocese.

Watch this space!

'Where's our climate going? Evidence from the deep past'

An illustrated talk by Dr Andrew Bell
(retired geologist and former Open University lecturer)

Over the last 500 million years, Eden has variously been a sandy desert, lain at the bottom of a deep ocean, been a tropical island paradise, and been covered by a thick ice sheet.

At times in the geological past, British sea level stood over 100m higher and air temperatures were 15 degrees C higher than they are today; then our dry-land area was reduced to half what it currently is. At other times, air temperatures were 10 degrees C lower than today, sea level was very much lower, and almost twice the acreage of dry land was exposed.

Today, the issue of our changing climate, and human's part in it, is a topic of hot debate.

What can we learn from studying the Earth's past? Can we be sure of what the future holds? Or is it all simply hot air!

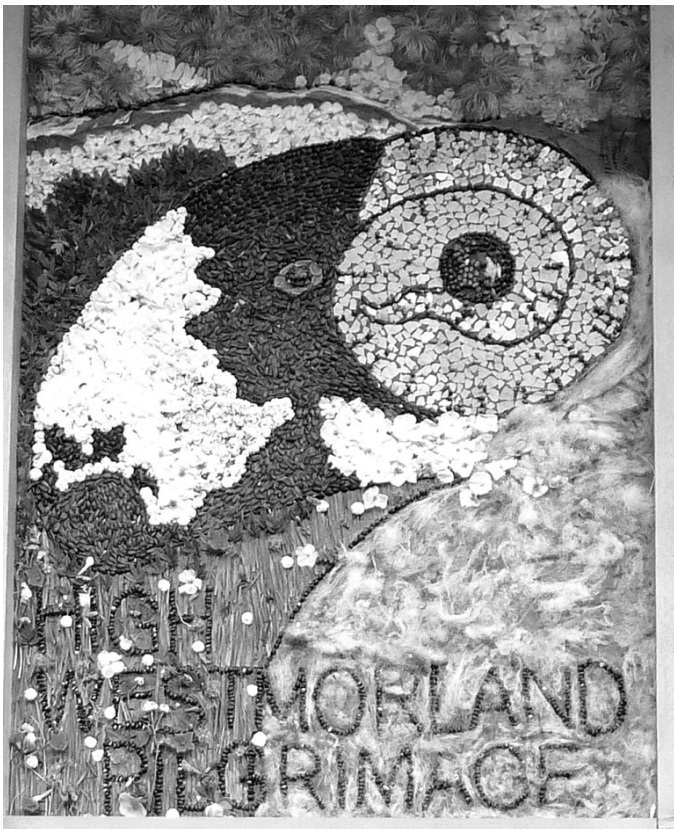
